#### I Know Why God's Wonderous Grace

In the waking thoughts of early this morning I found the lyrics of "Tell Me the Story of Jesus" running through my mind- over and over and over again as dawn's daylight lightened the sky. It happens quite regularly, a song



is part of my waking thoughts. I regard those semi-conscious thoughts as the cry of my soul with the One who has redeemed me.

However, and it is a "big however," there is one thing we do understand, and it holds us together spiritually, emotionally, and relationally. Without this truth we struggle with life and its difficulties.

The author, D. W. Whittle married the wife of his youth the day before he left to serve in the Massachusetts troops in the civil war. Following the war he settled in Chicago and served with D. L. Moody in his evangelism outreach. This gospel song is based on the truth of 2Timothy 1:12-- *"That is why I am suffering as I am. Yet this is no cause for shame, because I know whom I have believed, and am convinced that He is able to guard what I have entrusted to him until that day."* Read the text, embrace the truth, and let your soul affirm that by which you will live and ultimately die.

I know not why God's wondrous grace To me He hath made known, Nor why, unworthy, Christ in love Redeemed me for His own.

But "I know Whom I have believed And am persuaded that He is able To keep that which I've committed Unto Him against that day."

## **Chaplain Jottings**



#### For a Change: God at Work Behind Bars

"Change is the only constant." It's a familiar phrase—maybe even a cliché—but for those of us at Chester County Prison, it has never rung truer.

Over the past decade, the prison has undergone a wave of transformation. Some changes were dramatic, like the much-publicized escape of a dangerous inmate that suddenly put a quiet institution under the glare of national media. Others were quieter but no less significant—a slow churn in staff turnover, compounded by the chaos and havoc of four years under COVID.

The result? A near-total turnover in leadership. Senior management was replaced. Many in middle management moved on or up. For those who remained, uncertainty loomed. The arrival of "outsiders" to key positions stirred both hope and anxiety. Promotions motivated some. Others, feeling overlooked or undervalued, chose to retire or move on. It has been, by all accounts, an institutional reset—one that is still in process.

But amid all this upheaval, one thing has remained steady: God's power to transform lives.

As Christians, we know change intimately. We once were lost—living in our "Before Christ" (BC) days—but by grace, we were made new. We didn't just adjust our behavior. We were reborn. The Holy Spirit took up residence in us and began the lifelong work of changing us from the inside out.

In that sense, we are all part of a prison ministry—because every believer is a testimony to God's ability to redeem, restore, and renew.

And that's what we continue to witness here at Chester County Prison. Even as policies shift and staff dynamics evolve, God is working in the hearts of inmates and officers alike. Men and women are experiencing deep, internal change—the kind that doesn't make headlines but transforms eternally.

Please continue to pray for all of us here. Pray for peace amid transition. Pray for wisdom in leadership. But most of all, pray that God will keep changing each of us—staff and inmates alike—more and more into His image.

Change is constant, Change is necessary but Christ is greater, always the same...yesterday, today and forever.

#### The Wise and the Foolish

In a recent chapel service, I shared with the women Jesus' parable about the wise and the foolish builders found in Luke 6 and Matthew 7. It is, of course, a brilliant illustration of how we build our lives and the choices we make, and the consequences of those choices. I love to bring this teaching out from time to time to get the women to think about their choices, as I invariably ask them at some point in the message if they have built their houses on the shifting sand (the standards, morals, and customs of this world) or if they have built their houses on the Rock (God's eternal Word). I know it sometimes, or even often, makes them a little uncomfortable to be confronted in such a direct way with a question like this, but that's okay. I want to get them to think. I want them to realize that there is another way to go, another and different path to take than the one they've been on in their lives.

This most recent time, when I got to the point of asking that question, as usual, there was uneasy shifting in their seats, eyes darting away, and hands fidgeting with clothing and hair, as I let the question hang in the air. I don't really expect anyone to give me an answer. I don't want to put anyone on the spot, but again, I want to get them to think about their lives and their choices. I let them know, even if they have been a foolish builder up till now, it's okay; they can change and become a wise builder.

This time, I had the pleasant surprise of one of the women who spoke out and said she had been a foolish builder for a great number of years, but during her current stay there at the prison, something has changed. She went on to give one of the most honest and heart-felt testimonies I have heard in a long time; speaking of God's power to change a life, and His grace and mercy to those who don't deserve it.

The other women listened with rapt attention. As she spoke, every word rang with truth and it made my heart so glad. I knew that this woman got it. She has become a living example of what the Lord was getting at with this parable; someone who has seen the emptiness of going our own way and has turned to God's way. I was so grateful for the other women to hear her and to have this example set before them. I pray that they will see that if God could do that for this woman, who they see as "one of them", then He can do the same for them. I pray that He would continue to change "foolish builders" into "wise builders".

#### Small Stuff

Some time back I took a friend to lunch who was a practicing psychologist. I had a good reason to invite him to lunch; I was stressed about something heading my way in life. Being the good psychologist he was, he listened as I bemoaned my situation. When I finally got through telling him how bad life was getting ready to be for me, he smiled lightly and told me that there were only two things I needed to understand to get through any difficulty in life:

1. Don't sweat the small stuff. It will drive you crazy.

Nodding that I understood number one, he shared number two:

2. Remember, it's all small stuff.

It wasn't until long after my difficulty had passed that I began to realize the wisdom of what he had said. In the light of eternity, everything else is small stuff.

Each Monday night we face men who often see disaster headed their way. They have been arrested and jailed. They are often facing long sentences, are depressed and will not be there to raise their children or hug their wives, sometimes for many years. It doesn't feel like small stuff to them.

There is but one fail-safe shelter in such stormy times and that is the comfort of knowing that, if one is saved, he can rely on God to see him through.

The message in Proverbs 3:5-6 is simple but profound:

Trust in The Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding, acknowledge Him in all your ways and He will guide your path.
